2019-2020 Information Packet

The Study is excited to continue to offer education up to grade 6 for the 2019-2020 school year. Our small class sizes and direct instruction allow teachers to adjust their curriculum according to the student's needs, abilities, and assessment results. The flexible curriculum will be Saxon and A Beka for math, and Sonday Systems, Shurley Method, Spectrum, and Houghton Mifflin for Language Arts.

Students will participate in computer use, physical education, music, science units such as Salmon in the Classroom, Zones of the Ocean, and Owls. Other supplemental units will include author studies, Alaska, and the Revolutionary War.

Our program will run August 2019-May 2020. Students will wear uniforms (navy or tan khaki pants and maroon polo shirts) and bring a lunch daily.

School will begin at 8:30am and end at 2:30pm. Students may be dropped off as early as 8am.

Tuition is \$605 plus tax per month. Tuition is due before the 10th of the month. Late tuition payments will be charged a 5% penalty.

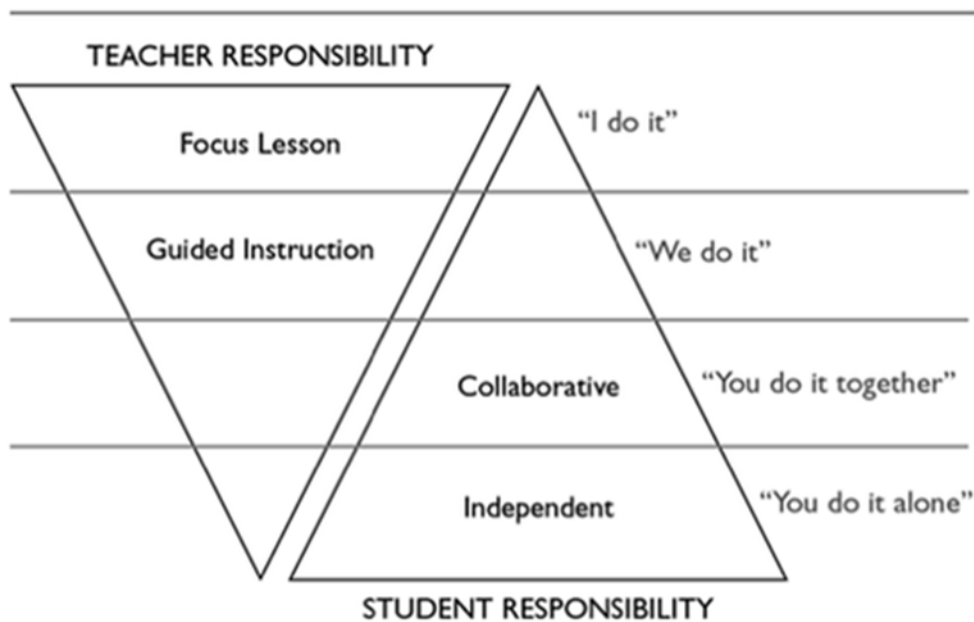

How does a multi-grade classroom successfully function?

The model of learning that we use in our school is called *scaffolding*. A scaffold is a temporary platform to provide support. Scaffolds help people reach higher levels that they could not reach without support.

When scaffolding a classroom, teachers create and maintain a classroom environment where all children have the opportunity to learn. They scaffold learning to read using systematic instruction. Teachers gradually release the responsibility of learning from the teacher to the individual child.

The Study's Late Pick-up Policy

We at The Study pride ourselves on our small school size, which allows us to provide a holistic, quality education. However, our small size does not allow for additional staff to provide child care services.

We understand that emergencies can happen, however in order to prevent chronic late pickups we have decided to implement the following late pick-up policy for the coming 2018-2019 school year.

We allow a 10-minute grace period for parents who may occasionally run late. In the event that a parent/guardian cannot pick up their child on time, The Study should be notified as soon as possible. By 10 minutes after your child's appointment is scheduled to end, all children are expected to have been picked up by a parent or guardian.

Parents or guardians arriving 15 minutes late or later will be charged an additional per-child group tutoring rate in 30-minute increments. Our current group tutoring rate is \$20 per half hour. The late fee will be added to your student's invoice and billed on a monthly basis.

Connections and IDEA will not pay for late pick-up fees.
